



- Newspaper & Inserts
- Magazines & Catalogs
- Junk Mail & Envelopes
- Telephone Books
- Chipboard Boxes
 - Cereal and cracker boxes with the inside packaging removed.
- Corrugated Cardboard
 - The cardboard with the ripple in the middle can now be recycled
 - Break or cut boxes and flatten to fit in paper recycling container



GLASS That CAN Be Recycled

- All colors - green, clear, brown
- All bottles that contained pourable liquids
- All jars that contained food products



GLASS That CAN'T Be Recycled



- Window Glass
- Ceramics/Coffee Mugs
- Crystal and Mirrors
- Light Bulbs & Florescent Tubes

How To Recycle GLASS

- Remove and discard lids, rinse food out of containers and put them in your recycling bin - no need to remove the labels.



PAPER That CAN'T Be Recycled



- Pizza boxes and any other paper that has food, paint, oil, or other contaminants on it goes in the trash.

How To Recycle PAPER

- Simply place your paper in your recycling bin. No need to sort with single stream recycling!

- No styrofoam cups or packaging
- No clear formed food trays
- No flower pots or garden flats
- No plastic bags or stretch wrap

Our semi-annual Electronic Collection program will also be held on Saturday, April 7th from 9 a.m. to 12 noon behind the Public Works garage at the Township Complex. **PLEASE BE AWARE THAT THERE IS A \$20 CHARGE PER TELEVISION OR COMPUTER MONITOR THAT WILL BE COLLECTED AT THE TIME OF DROP OFF. THIS CHARGE IS FOR TELEVISIONS AND COMPUTER MONITORS ONLY. ALL OTHER ITEMS ARE STILL COLLECTED FOR FREE.** Items accepted include almost anything with a battery or cord, however no large white items, such as refrigerators, washers, or dryers, will be accepted.



Route 202 Widening Project Beginning Construction



For years now, maybe even decades, the reconstruction and widening of Rt. 202 (Dekalb Pike) has been discussed. Well, the funding has been secured, the project design is all but completed and construction is about to begin.

For those of you that aren't aware, the Rt. 202 Improvement project has been ongoing for several years both to the south of East Norriton in Norristown and Chester County and to our north in Montgomery Township and beyond. The portions yet to be improved are in East Norriton, Whitpain and Lower Gwynedd Townships. The map above shows the various project sections and other key locations where work will be completed. The sections that will most directly affect East Norriton are US 202 Sec 61S, US 202 Sec 61N and SR 3001 Sec OFF.

PHASE 1

Beginning February 2018 until December 2018

The first section to be undertaken is SR 3001 Sec OFF, which includes "offsite" drainage and intersection improvements along Township Line Rd. This was scheduled to begin in February of 2018. This section will be completed in advance of construction on Rt. 202 itself, to improve traffic flow around the construction zones while the Rt. 202 improvements are constructed.

Work will begin at the intersection of Township Line and Arch Roads with drainage improvements, utility relocations, traffic signal improvements and road widening for new left turn lanes. Construction will extend from Kimberly Dr. to just past Arch Rd. on Twp. Line Rd. and each side of Arch Rd. will be affected as well. Most of the widening and utility work will be on the East Norriton sides of both Twp. Line and Arch Roads.

Work will then progress to the intersection of Township Line and North Wales Roads with similar improvements (drainage, utility

relocation, widening and signal improvements). Again most of the widening and improvements will be on the East Norriton side of Twp. Line Rd, extending from Sharon Ln. to the railroad tracks and along North Wales Rd. for several hundred feet.

PHASE 2

Beginning Summer 2018 through 2021

Section 61N in Whitpain Township is the next construction phase, extending from Township Line Rd. (East Norriton/Whitpain border) to Morris Rd. Stormwater improvements, bridge/culvert work, widening to a 5-lane cross section, pedestrian, bicycle and signal improvements are all planned for this phase.

PHASE 3

Beginning Spring/Summer 2019 through 2022

Last but not least will be Section 61S in East Norriton which extends from Johnson Highway to Township Line Road. As with the other phases, stormwater improvements, bridge/culvert replacements, widening to 4 lanes with bike lanes and sidewalks and signal upgrades are all part of the project scope.

The impacts of this important project will be felt by all of us. Please know that East Norriton Township, along with PennDOT, is committed to assisting residents, business owners and the motoring public with any issues that may arise during construction. Procedures are in place to deal with congestion by adjusting traffic signal timing at affected intersections, if needed. The Township is also keenly aware of the potential impact to our local roadway network and is working closely with PennDOT on these issues.

Unfortunately, despite our best intentions and forethought, construction related impacts are inevitable. The Township has open and regular communications with PennDOT and its contractors and we will do our best to work through any issues. How many of us have done forty in a 25 MPH zone, or rolled through a stop sign or failed to slow down in a 15 MPH school zone? He blushes, as he raises his own hand in embarrassment. We've all done it. Been there...done that! And it's nothing to be proud of, right? Right!

We all lead busy and hectic lives and we're all rushing around, whether it's late to work, late to a meeting, rushing to get our kids to practice on time or to just get home in time for dinner. We all fall into that trap, where we push the envelope just a little more not realizing how we affect the lives, and the quality of life, of others. "Everybody does it. I'm just going with the flow," we tell ourselves to ease our collective conscience. We grumble about how ridiculous a 35 MPH speed limit is on Potshop Road; or about the stop signs on Hartranft Blvd; or the speed humps on Meadowbrook. Like it or not, agree with it or not, they are all there for a reason.

Unfortunately, there is only so much the Township and the East Norriton Police Department can do. We are limited by our own resources and by the laws, ordinances and guidelines we are obligated to follow. The Police simply cannot perform all of the speed and stop sign enforcement details we'd all like them to, and still provide the necessary emergency and community services we've come to expect. The Public Works Department cannot install all the physical impediments (signage, pavement markings, traffic calming features, etc.) everyone would like us to, and have them be legal, safe, cost-effective and enforceable.

Studies completed by a lot of really smart people have shown that too much signage leads to people ignoring all signs, even the important ones. It's called "sign clutter." Other studies have determined that stop signs or other physical impediments to speeding; such as speed humps, when improperly placed or in too great a number, can lead to increased speeds between those features. People speed up to make up for the lost time stopping at a stop sign or for slowing down for a speed hump.

The point is, there is no perfect solution. It takes a combination of public education, public cooperation, police enforcement and physical controls to effectively achieve the results we all desire...safe streets and neighborhoods. When you travel the roads of East Norriton, please remember that even if it's not your neighborhood, it's somebody's neighborhood. After all, isn't that the beauty of East Norriton? We're a collection of neighborhoods, all with the common ideal that quality of life matters. We all need to do our part. It all starts with each one of us. So tell your family, your friends, and your neighbors, SLOW DOWN...BE SAFE...BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR!!



SPRING LEAF COLLECTION

WHAT:

Vacuum collection of leaves only.
NO BAGGED LEAVES!

WHEN:

2-week period between April 16th & 27th
There is no set schedule, simply call in and our crew will be out in a timely manner!

WHERE:

Curbside collection of raked leaves on all Township owned streets. Residents who live along the busier streets in the Township (Germantown Pike, Dekalb Pike, Township Line, Swede, Whitehall, Trooper, and Burnside) are asked not to rake your leaves into the street as this can create a safety hazard to motorists.

HOW:

SCHEDULED-SERVICE ONLY!

See the "How do I schedule" section.
All requests must be received by Wednesday, April 25th.

Please understand that this service is for leaves only!

Any piles containing branches, limbs, brush, grass clippings or other debris will not be collected.

This is separate from the Yard Waste Recycling Program. Please refer to the Yard Waste Recycling Program article in this newsletter for details about that program.

Yard Waste Recycling Reminders

Yard waste collections now begins on the **3rd Monday** of each month. If a collection day falls on a scheduled holiday, this service will be provided on the next business day.

- This is a scheduled service. See the "How do I schedule" section. **Deadline is noon on the Friday before collection.**
- OK – shrubbery, branches, limbs and garden residue.
- NOT OK – stumps, root balls, weeds, grass, leaves and old firewood. No plastic bags, heavy rope or wire (string or twine only).
- Place within 5 ft. of curb (not in the street or on sidewalk).
- Limits – 2 cubic yards per property (pile 6' L x 3' H x 3' D or six bundles).
- Bundles (smaller branches) – max 2' diameter, 40 lbs. and at least 3 ft. long.
- Large Branches – Max 5" diameter. No need to bundle large branches (8-10 ft. long) as they feed easily into chipper. No need to cut up. Just place cut end towards the street.
- Proper preparation is key to ensuring your yard waste gets collected.

The Township provides this service free of charge as a convenience to our residents and is intended for residents to dispose of limited quantities of yard waste; it is not a supplemental service for local tree contractors. If you hire a tree contractor, they should include branch disposal as part of their contract and not place branches at the curb for the Township to pick up.

How Do I Schedule Yard Waste and Spring Leaf Collections?

To make scheduling a collection easier and more convenient, you have 2 options, online or by phone.

Comprehensive Plan Committee Continues Their Work

Residents often inquire how future development and redevelopment will affect East Norriton Township. At the Board of Supervisors February 2017 meeting, a Comprehensive Plan Committee was appointed to work in conjunction with the Board of Supervisors to focus on comprehensive plan revisions to ensure the viability and prosperity of local businesses, help maintain open space, and create sustainable, reasonable residential and commercial development. The Committee has had several public meetings earlier this year to review, assess and make recommendations to achieve sound planning and comprehensive goals.

Dumpsters & Pods

East Norriton Township requires a Dumpster Permit for all

stand-alone dumpster(s) including bagsters/ bag dumpster(s) and POD(s) that are not currently associated with an existing permit.

The current fee for this permit is \$25, and if obtained in conjunction with a Demolition Permit, is not a separate fee. The permit forms are available on the Township website as well as at the Township Building.

Yard & Garage Sales

Spring is coming, are you planning on having a Yard or Garage Sale? In East Norriton, two yard/ garage sales per year are permitted and do not require a permit. No yard/ garage sale may be conducted for more than three consecutive days. One on-site sign is allowed no larger than four square feet, and two off site signs are allowed, with each sign measuring no larger than two square feet. Please remember to take down your signage promptly.

voted to keep the property tax rate at 2.727 mills. This means that East Norriton Township taxpayers will not see an increase in the Township portion of the property taxes for the ninth consecutive year! Based on an average property valuation of \$178,655, the average taxpayer will pay \$487.19 in Township real estate taxes.

Where Do Your Taxes Go?

Well, based on the average bill amount of \$487.19, the chart below shows how your tax dollars are distributed in the Township budget. The largest segment - General Fund – pays for police, highway, and code enforcement services.

Spring Safety Tips

Spring is in the air and that could mean spring cleaning for some residents! Be sure to follow these safety tips while cleaning your house or tidying up your yard!

- When you do your spring cleaning, dispose of those old cans of paint and thinners and accumulated newspapers and magazines. Check the flyer in this newsletter for times and locations to drop off household hazardous materials.
- When you clean windows check them for ease of opening as you may need them as a means of exit in case of fire.
- Replace or clean your furnace filter. A dirty filter can lower the efficiency of the heating/cooling system, increase heating costs and cause fires.
- Clean the kitchen exhaust hood and air filter. Keeping this clean of cooking grease will help keep a stovetop fire from spreading.
- Always have a multi-purpose fire extinguisher accessible. Make sure it is Underwriters Laboratories (UL) listed or Factory Mutual (FM) approved. Check the gauges to make sure they are charged and ready to use.
- Check your water heater. If you have a gas-fired water heater, check to make sure it is venting properly. Light a match next to the vent and wave it out (don't blow it out). See if the smoke is pulled up into the vent. If it isn't, have a professional inspect and repair it. Otherwise, carbon monoxide and other combustibles can build up in the home.
- Clean your clothes dryer exhaust duct, damper and space under the dryer. Poor maintenance allows lint to build up in the exhaust duct and can cause fires.
- Replace all extension cords that have become brittle, worn or damaged. Exposed wires may cause arcing, which will produce heat and can start a fire. Keep appliances and their power cords away from water or a heat source because this will damage the cord's insulation.

Chiminea and Outdoor Fireplace Safety




Chimineas and outdoor fireplaces are very popular in backyards throughout East Norriton Township. Although their use is allowed under the Fire Code, there are restrictions that residents must comply with. Adhering to the requirements and safety tips

will assure a safe and enjoyable outdoor experience.

Fireworks and Safety

There is a lot that can be done to protect children and the public from fireworks injuries. Set family rules, only adults should light fireworks. Fireworks should not be available to tempt young children, and should be stored in a secured location to prohibit their access. Lastly, check for additional restrictions in your area. Summer weather conditions make grass and other vegetation dry and vulnerable to fire. Use care in selecting the area where you will be discharging fireworks.

Most importantly talk to your kids about fireworks and safety. Teach your family about the following three B's: Be Prepared, Be Safe and Be Responsible.



BEFORE LIGHTING FIREWORKS: Be Prepared!

Purchase only legal fireworks available at licensed stands. Purchase only the quantity that you will use. Ensure the safety of pets. Keep a bucket of water nearby in which to place all used fireworks. Have a water hose or fire extinguisher nearby to put out stray sparks. Clear a level area away from things that can burn, including all structures. Know the emergency number to call for your area, your address/location, and basic first aid. Teach your children to "stop, drop, cover, and roll" if their clothes catch on fire.

WHEN LIGHTING FIREWORKS: Be Safe!

Only adults should light fireworks. Use eye protection, such as safety goggles. Light one at a time and move away quickly. Keep spectators at a safe distance. Use only outdoors, away from anything that can burn. To prevent injuries, follow the directions on the package label carefully.

WHEN FINISHED: Be Responsible!

Clean up all debris when finished. Duds can be dangerous; if a fireworks item does not light or fire, an adult should wait at least fifteen minutes, approach it carefully, and place it in a bucket of water. Make sure unused fireworks, matches and lighters are out of sight and reach of children.



Sparklers – Not Such A Bright Idea...

We know fireworks can be fun and young kids often look adorable holding sparklers. Unfortunately, little arms are too short to hold sparklers, and sparklers can heat up to 1,200 degrees. Try this instead: let your young children use glow sticks. Glow sticks can be just as fun, but they don't burn at a temperature hot enough to melt glass and are much safer for children.



Outdoor Safety

- When using ladders, check for safe and proper placement. Be aware of any obstructions, overhead wires, electrical, cable, phone and tree branches.
- Check cords and outlets for fraying or exposed wiring on all electrically operated equipment.
- On gas operated equipment, check fuel lines and connectors for leaking fuel. Never use or store gasoline indoors.
- Fill lawn mowers, motorbikes, and power saws outside and only when the motor is cool. Store gasoline in a cool place away from the house in a detached garage or shed, and always in an approved safety can.
- Keep gasoline and all flammable liquids away from children!!!

As summer and the warm weather approaches please play it safe. Check your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors regularly. Practice your home fire evacuation, which should include a designated meeting place, make it a part of your family routine. Try to establish two ways to exit your home or business in an emergency. Remember to close your doors when you go to sleep – it saves lives and property. GET OUT AND STAY OUT!

Fire deaths can be reduced by teaching people the basic facts about fire. FIRE IS FAST! In less than thirty seconds, a small flame

can get out of control and turn into a major fire. It only takes minutes for thick black smoke to fill a house and the house to become engulfed in flames. If you wake up to a fire you won't have time to grab valuables. The fire spreads too quickly and the smoke is too thick; there is only time to escape. FIRE IS HOT! Heat from a fire alone can kill; room temperatures can reach 100 degrees at floor level and rise to 600 degrees at eye level. Inhaling this super-hot air will scorch your lungs. This heat can melt clothes to your skin. Within five minutes a room can get so hot that everything in it ignites at once. FIRE IS DEADLY! Smoke and toxic gases kill more people than the actual flames of a fire. Fire uses up the oxygen you need and produces smoke and poisonous gases that kill. Breathing even small amounts of smoke and toxic gases can make you drowsy, disoriented, and short of breath.
