SPRING LEAF COLLECTION

WHAT:

**Vacuum collection of leaves only.
NO BAGGED LEAVES!**

WHEN:

2-week period between April 13th & 24th
There is no set schedule, simply call in and our crew will be out in a timely manner!

WHERE:

Curbside collection of raked leaves on all Township owned streets. Residents who live along the busier streets in the Township (Germantown Pike, Dekalb Pike, Township Line, Swede, Whitehall, Trooper, and Burnside) are asked not to rake your leaves into the street as this can create a safety hazard to motorists.

HOW:

SCHEDULED-SERVICE ONLY!

See the “How do I schedule” section.
All requests must be received by Wednesday, April 22nd.

Please understand that this service is for leaves only!

Any piles containing branches, limbs, brush, grass clippings or other debris will not be collected.

This is separate from the Yard Waste Recycling Program.

Yard Waste Recycling Reminders

Yard waste collections now begins on the **3rd Monday** of each month. If a collection day falls on a scheduled holiday, this service will be provided on the next business day.

- This is a scheduled service. See the “How do I schedule” section. **Deadline is noon on the Friday before collection.**
- OK – shrubbery, branches, limbs and garden residue.
- NOT OK – stumps, root balls, weeds, grass, leaves and old firewood. No plastic bags, heavy rope or wire (string or twine only).
- Place within 5 ft. of curb (not in the street or on sidewalk).
- Limits – 2 cubic yards per property (pile 6’ L x 3’ H x 3’ D or six bundles).
- Bundles (smaller branches) – max 2’ diameter, 40 lbs. and at least 3 ft. long.
- Large Branches – Max 5” diameter. No need to bundle large branches (8-10 ft. long) as they feed easily into chipper. No need to cut up. Just place cut end towards the street.
- Proper preparation is key to ensuring your yard waste gets collected.

The Township provides this service free of charge as a convenience to our residents and is intended for residents to dispose of limited quantities of yard waste; it is not a supplemental service for local tree contractors. If you hire a tree contractor, they should include branch disposal as part of their contract and not place branches at the curb for the Township to pick up.

How Do I Schedule Yard Waste and Spring Leaf Collections?

To make scheduling a collection easier and more convenient, you have 2 options, online or by phone.

- We encourage you to visit www.eastnorritontwp.org. On the left side of our homepage, just click the “Sign up for Yard Waste Pick Up” under quick links and complete the appropriate form. Just a name, address and phone number and you’re on the list. Easy Peasy!
- If you’d prefer to speak with one of our staff members, we would be happy to take your registration by phone at **610-275-2800** and press 0 for the receptionist.

Homeowner's Guide to Rain Gardens

What is it?

A rain garden is a shallow depression that will hold stormwater runoff. It is planted with specially selected native vegetation that will filter runoff and increase infiltration.

How does it work?

Rain gardens reduce the amount of runoff and remove pollutants. As the water pools in the depression, it can infiltrate deeper into the soil, or be used by the vegetation through evapotranspiration. The deep and dense root system of perennial vegetation increases the amount of water that infiltrate as compared to the shallow roots of lawn grasses. Even in a larger event during which the rain garden may overflow, runoff is still filtered through the vegetation removing pollutants.

How do you maintain it?

Vegetation needs to be checked to make sure that it's healthy. Any bare spots need to be replanted. Check the inflow area to make sure that there isn't any sediment building up. Remove any accumulated sediment. Mulch should be re-spread when erosion is evident and be replenished as needed.

Perennial plants should be cut back if needed by species type and any dead vegetation should be removed at the end of the growing season.

Apply mulch in the spring as needed to cover soil. Mulch should be 1-3 inches deep. Do not use mulch to "fill-in" the depression of the rain garden. That depression area is needed for stormwater management.

Close the Loop-Recycling

The term “close the loop” is a new phrase that is being tossed around in the recycling community. Closed-loop recycling refers to a production process that allows post-consumer waste to be collected and recycled and then used to make new products. One of the ways you can contribute to this type of recycling is by utilizing the new County wide recycling program that was implemented this past year. Montgomery County is proud to announce its partnership with **retrievr**—formerly called Curb My Clutter. **Retrievr** is available County-wide and it is a company that picks up and recycles electronics as well as clothing! We all have clothes and electronics that we no longer use—**retrievr** is the ONLY program that collects these items right from your door for recycling! You can schedule a pick up by calling, texting or scheduling on their website. While there is a small fee for some items— \$10 for microwaves, \$35 for each TV under 150 lbs., as well as CRT monitors, and \$100 for each TV over 150lbs, all other items are free of charge. One of the most asked questions we get here at the township office is “how do I get rid of an old TV!?” With the implementation of this program you won’t have to search and wait for an electronic recycling event in your area. We all have clothes and electronics we no longer use cluttering our closets, drawers, and basements. **Retrievr** is the only program that collects these items right from your door and then recycles them for you.

Your neighbors have already discovered the joy of decluttering their homes by recycling over 50 tons of clothing and electronics. Now you can, too!

Thanks to Montgomery County's partnership with **retrievr**, you can recycle your clothing and electronics right from your doorstep. This service is **FREE** for all clothing, textiles, and small electronics. Simply visit [retrievr](http://retrievr.com) or text the word **PICKUP** to **757-70-FETCH** (757-703-3824), and **retrievr** will send a truck to your home. Bag up your items and leave them on your porch; or, leave them inside your door and tell **retrievr** to ring your bell when they arrive.

Convenience fees apply only for certain items: \$10 for each microwave, \$35 for each TV under 150 lbs, and \$100 for each TV 150 lbs or more.

When does the program go into effect?

Right now! Simply visit retrievr.com or text the word **PICKUP** to **757-70-FETCH** (757-703-3824) and follow the guided scheduler to set a date.

What if I can't send text messages?

Call our number and leave a voicemail. Someone will contact you to schedule a pickup.

What items do you accept?

Visit [retrievr](http://retrievr.com) for a full list of accepted items.

Where should I leave my items?

You can leave your items on your porch, just outside your door, or just outside your garage.

What if I have items I don't want to leave outside, is that okay?

Yes! You might prefer to keep items like computers, phones, or tablets indoors until the driver arrives. When you schedule your pickup, you can ask **retrievr** to ring your bell when they arrive.

Can I get a tax write off for items collected?

No. Just as your recycled paper, bottles and cans are not tax deductible, neither are recycled clothing and electronics.

If you have access to a local donation center and prefer to donate some or all of your items, we respect that choice. Donation keeps your items out of the landfill, which makes us happy.

Home, Hospital, Restaurants, Houses

The Jefferson Crossing development has a history that is unusual. For the land it resides on has had varied uses. As early as 1848 there was a home on the property at 2519 DeKalb Pike in East

large elegant ballroom and banquet hall to the rear of the existing restaurant and many celebrations and grand events were held there.



On New Years' Day in 2002 a fire burned the interior of the original Jefferson House, and it ended the operation of the original elegant restaurant. Only the banquet ballroom continued to operate for a short period of time. The days of fine dining were over for the Jefferson House Restaurant.

In June of 2004, the property was sold to builders, Philomeno and Salamone, and in 2005, a housing development of 89 units, called Jefferson Crossing, was completed.


Norriton Township; that home was destroyed by fire in 1920. After the fire a mansion designed by Mantle Fielding, who was influenced by Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, was then built on the site for William S. Buckland and his wife, Henrietta. On February 17, 1948, after the death of her husband, Mrs. Buckland sold the property to her daughter, Jeanette and her husband, Russell Hunsberger for one dollar.

In April of 1949, the Hunsberger's sold the palatial home, with a natural swimming pool to the Montgomery County Chiropractic Association. The Association transformed the home into a thirty bed Montgomery County Hospital and Sanitarium. This would be the first Chiropractic Hospital in Pennsylvania and the second in the United States. The Hospital had a grand opening on September 17, 1949 and was in existence for several years.

The hospital property was then sold to Michael Russo of Norristown, and he opened and operated the General DeKalb Inn, the first restaurant on the property.

In 1968 the restaurant was sold to Myran Hankin and Angelo Romano and renamed the Jefferson House. By 1970, Mr. Romano was the sole owner of the Jefferson House. Mr. Romano, in addition to establishing a fine restaurant, was a master of sugar sculptures. He won many contests in the field of sugar sculpturing and won a world wide contest in 1980. He added a

In 2006, the gazebo from the original Jefferson House was gifted to East Norriton Township. It was placed on the crest of a hill near the Township Building where it overlooks the township property and offers a beautiful view of the surrounding areas. A part of the Jefferson House lives on for future generations to enjoy.


Drop Off Your Old, Worn or Tattered Flags

NO TAX INCREASE FOR 2020!

At their December 2019 meeting, the Board of Supervisors approved the 2020 Annual Township budget with no increase in the township property tax or sewer rates! The budget, which funds all operations of the Township, totals \$19.4 million and keeps each resident's real estate taxes at 2.727 mills – the same rate it has been for eleven years! The chart below shows how your tax dollars are used at the Township.



IDA Issues \$10,000,000 in Bonds

The East Norriton Industrial Development Authority recently completed the issuance of \$10,000,000 in tax-exempt bonds for the Emergency Care Research Institute. The bonds issued by the IDA will help finance a major upgrade to the ECRI facility, which is anticipated to substantially increase employment opportunities in our region. ECRI, located in Plymouth Meeting, PA, conducts unbiased research and programs to advance effective, evidence-based healthcare globally. The East Norriton IDA was established in 2003 by East Norriton Township under the Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Law. Its mission is to advance economic development opportunities and provide financing for non-profit facilities and manufacturing companies in the East Norriton Township region. Fees received from the issuance of bonds in recent years have been used to help fund East Norriton Township Parks & Recreation activities.

FROM THE TAX COLLECTOR

2019 was a busy year for the Tax Collectors office. Taxes were collected for over 98% of the parcels in East Norriton Township. That translates to more than 6 million dollars collected for the township and county.

In addition to my duties as the tax collector, I focused on community outreach initiatives during the year. I was proud to support the East Norriton Little League with their fundraising drive as well as the Norriton Fire Company as a corporate sponsor for their annual joint golf outing with Jeffersonville Fire Co. Additionally, along with County Treasurer Jason Salus, hosted my second annual document shredding event. More events are planned for 2020.

My office will continue to operate out of American Heritage Federal Credit Union at 2716 DeKalb Pike (across from Mercy Suburban Hospital). Payments will be accepted during all business hours. Additionally, my office hours will remain Tuesdays 1pm-4pm and Thursdays 10am-1pm from March through December. Appointments are available upon request.

Be a Hero!



Pennsylvania-home of the first volunteer fire department, founded by Benjamin Franklin in 1736, now faces a crisis as the number of volunteers continues to fall amid funding needs and training challenges. Our own Norriton Fire Company has responded to over 500 calls alone in 2019. Each year the number of calls seems to increase while the manpower seems to decrease, as there are fewer people who wish to volunteer their time as a member of the fire department. **So how can you help?**

1 Join the Fire Department

As an all-volunteer Fire Company that has serviced the Township for over 100 years, we need volunteers now more than ever. All training for volunteers is provided at the Montgomery County Fire School as well as training every other Monday night at the Fire House.

We maintain two firehouses within East Norriton Township. Station A, located at 2830 Swede Rd, which is the main station and houses a 75-foot ladder truck, an Engine and a Light & Air Truck. And Station B, our substation at 656 W Germantown Pike, which houses a 100-foot ladder truck, a Rescue/Pumper and a Utility Vehicle. As you can see, we are equipped to respond to all types of emergencies, not just fires!

The duties of firefighters have shifted over the years. They also are regularly dispatched for water rescues, elevator rescues, vehicular accidents, hazardous material spills, drug overdoses, and natural disasters as well typical fire and alarm calls.

There are more calls coming in and fewer people to respond to them.

Volunteer opportunities in your area are listed on makemeafirefighter.org. Or stop by and visit us, take a tour of the station, talk to a firefighter and find out what we can offer!



And fire departments have tasks that don't involve fighting fires. That could include:

- Bookkeeping
- Fundraising
- Monitoring social media accounts
- Teaching fire safety to children
- Installing smoke alarms in area homes
- Helping with maintenance around the fire station and equipment

2 Donate to Your Local Department

The donations we receive help to provide our firefighters with the best equipment and training to do their jobs when responding to all types of emergencies. Training costs have increased greatly since the 1980s, and if a volunteer company is unable to front the costs, recruits may have to pay their own way. This means that for the most basic gear, a volunteer could face a \$3,000 expense. We thank you for your support with the annual fund drive, as it was once again a success.

Fundraising now takes up to 60 percent of a volunteer firefighter's time.

Donations don't always have to be money either. Fire departments often are in need of other supplies such as:

- Cases of bottled water
- Furniture for the station
- Construction items such as plywood, which can be used for training courses
- Food

Donations are always welcome. We appreciate any and all donations, and they could be tax-deductible!

3 Attend Fundraising Events

Attending a fundraising event organized by your local fire department is technically another way of donating, but you're getting something in return. Our annual joint golf outing with Jeffersonville Fire company is always a great event!

Fire departments often put a lot of time and effort into these events, and the proceeds go toward the fire department's expenses and needs.

For years, departments were able to rely on benefit auctions, carnivals, community bingo and raffles to cover costs. But now, with equipment prices rising and fewer volunteers to organize such functions, it's barely enough to get by. They need all the support they can get.

Warm Weather Safety Tips

It may be cold out right now, but Spring and Summer are right around the corner. Warm weather is just on the horizon and with the heat and sunny days soon to be upon us, we would like to help you beat the heat and sun. Heat-related illness happens when the body's temperature control system is overloaded. Infants and children up to 4 years of age are at greatest risk. Even young and healthy people can get sick from the heat if they participate in strenuous physical activities during hot weather. For heat-related illness, the best defense is prevention.

- **Never leave infants, children, or pets in a parked car, even if the windows are cracked open.**
- **Dress infants and children in loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.**
- **Schedule outdoor activities carefully, for morning and evening hours.**
- **Stay cool with cool showers or baths.**
- **Seek medical care immediately if your child has symptoms of heat-related illness.**

Just a few serious sunburns can increase you and your child's risk of skin cancer later in life. Their skin needs protection from the sun's harmful ultraviolet (UV) rays whenever they're outdoors.

- **Cover up- clothing that covers you, and your child's skin helps protect against UV rays.**
- **Use sunscreen with at least SPF (sun protection factor) 15 and UVA (ultraviolet A) and UVB (ultraviolet B) protection every time you and your child go outside.**

What You Need to Know About Hurricanes

With the Spring and Summer season also comes the threat of severe storms; such as hurricanes or tornadoes. While there have only been five hurricanes in Pennsylvania since 2000, the approach of Summer can bring about the possibility of hurricane watches and warnings. Know the difference between a "watch" and a "warning" and how to be prepared during this stormy season. Hurricane season officially starts June 1st and lasts until November 30th. Always listen to the radio and television for the latest information and instructions for your area.

A **Hurricane Watch** issued for your part of the County indicates the possibility that you could experience hurricane conditions within 36 hours. This WATCH should trigger your family's disaster plan, and protective measures should be initiated. Especially, those actions that require extra time such as securing items or bringing pets inside.


A **Hurricane Warning** issued for your part of the County indicates that sustained winds of at least 74 mph are expected within 24 hours. Once this WARNING has been issued, your family should be in the process of completing protective actions and deciding the safest location to be during the storm.

"Close Before You Doze" Campaign

Most people don't know the difference a closed door makes in a fire. You can change that.

In case of a fire, a closed door can isolate the fire's flow, reduce room temperature and keep carbon monoxide levels down. "Close Before You Doze" aims to make closing doors at night part of people's bedtime routine. People once had an average of 17 minutes to escape a burning home after the activation of a smoke detector. Today, that time has dropped to three minutes or less, mostly because of open floor plans and synthetic materials used to build and furnish homes, which burn more quickly than traditional materials.

To protect yourself and your loved ones, share this message as a potential life-saving measure against fast-moving home fires. Join the "Close Before You Doze" campaign.



During a Hurricane:

- Stay away from low-lying and flood prone areas.
- Always stay indoors during a hurricane, because strong winds will blow things around.
- Leave mobile homes and to go to a shelter.
- If your home isn't on higher ground, go to a shelter.
- If emergency managers say to evacuate, then do so immediately.

After a Hurricane:

- Stay indoors until it is safe to come out.
- Check for injured or trapped people, without putting yourself in danger.
- Watch out for flooding which can happen after a hurricane.
- Do not attempt to drive in flooding water.
- Stay away from standing water. It may be electrically charged from underground or downed power lines.
- Don't drink tap water until officials say it's safe to do so.

While hurricanes are not common in our area, it never hurts to be educated and prepared.
